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ICAs calendar for assortment revisions 2026

Ahead of 2026, ICA is launching a new calendar for assortment revisions. It replaces the industry-wide process coordinated within the ECR, which will cease at the turn of the year 2025/26.

ICA's calendar for assortment revisions follows the same routines as the previous ECR trade windows but offers more revision windows, with a total of twelve windows compared to the current nine. The goal of the new calendar is to even out the workload in stores by spreading the revisions throughout the year, while also taking into account seasonal and holiday periods.

The biggest difference for 2026, in addition to the spread over more windows, is that categories with high news intensity have a higher revision frequency, while other categories that do not have as many changes are revised less often.

Due to ICA's intention to operate with new assortment revision windows starting in 2026 and to charge a fee in connection with notification and launch, a special appendix for this purpose will be prepared. The appendix will be sent out for signing by both parties.

Processes and routines linked to the calendar 2026

ICA continues to use the same processes, routines, etc. that the 2025 ECR time window was built upon. Support for suppliers is available at GS1.se. The exception regarding 2026 is that ICA has chosen to increase the number of revision occasions from 9 to 12 and created our own revision calendar to reduce the burden of changes in stores

The revision process articles in/out – Overview

The following basic timetable applies for a trade item launch. This includes administrative procedures and rules. New or outgoing items must be notified no later than v.1 (-15 weeks).

The steps are described in more detail on the following pages. The dates in the table should be regarded as the absolute last opportunity to carry out the steps for assortment revision. Suppliers are encouraged to take the steps as soon as the information is available. It can be difficult to get through to support and central administration when the deadline is approaching. Steps 1, 4 and 5 are extra important to secure the launch in stores.

Step 1 week 1 **Deadline 1: Article notification**

The supplier notifies new and outgoing articles to the customer and submits article information according to the article implementation guide that can be found at GS1. (May be excluding food information). If complete article information has been produced, it is sent in now. NOTE, this can be done earlier than -15v).

Trade Item Information (VCD) must be submitted via GS1 including following:

- i Food information for items that require it
- i Accurate measurement data for all levels
- i The trade item information must be written in accordance with the rules found in the Guide Trade Item Information from GS1 Sweden
- i New GTIN codes on existing articles with some form of changes according to GS1 set rules for what is considered a change
- i Correctly specified pallet type at top level and possibly intermediate level. See code list for GS1's pallet types, T2244. Enter the correct standard dimensions based on the selected pallet type.

The notification must be in the new Supplier portal including quotation, market information and any target group definition.

- i **New for 2026!** At product notification - the ECR hierarchy has been removed and replaced by ICA's Merchandise hierarchy at the time of notification. As ICA has adjusted its calendar based on news intensity, the number of revisions per year may differ at the main category level. In Dairy, for example, the entire category except eggs is revised twice a year. Eggs only have one occasion. The notification must therefore be made at the lowest level when the product is notified. See the attached calendar for which level suits your product registration.
- i The price of the item must be stated on the orderable item. If no suggestion appears in the Product Notification, you need to go back and update the article information that governs the level at which the price proposal should be registered at ICA buys home at the retail packaging level.

Step 2 week 3-4: Supplier presentation

The supplier presents the trade item with product samples and product information to the Category Manager at ICA. The meeting is booked in agreement with the Category Manager and can take place before the time of notification.

Step 3 week 5-8: Listing notice

Product range listing decisions to suppliers shall be based on the information the provider presented in the item notification, provided it is approved in accordance with step 5 (see below).

Step 4 week 1-9 **Deadline 2**: Supplementary article information

Complete item information, including food information and product image (market and planogram image), is sent for quality assurance. The supplier must place an order for quality assurance in accordance with the GS1 standard no later than this step. Guide is available from GS1: [Quality assurance](#)

- i** Complete trade item information submitted via GS1 with any potential minor adjustments (IMPORTANT! Adjustments that do not affect the trade item structure, e.g. wrong temperature, wrong shelf life, correction of name, etc.)
- i** Notify Supplier Support and Category manager if you submit updated VCDs.

Step 5 week 1-10 **Deadline 3**: Approved Packaging Samples & Quality Assured

Food appendix

Product information, measurements and product images must be quality assured and approved in accordance with the GS1 standard. Validoo Q-Lab takes about 5 days to review an article and if the article is not approved, it takes another 5 days before you can get a new result. There is also express review that takes 3 days but at a higher cost. We would like to remind you as a supplier to **regularly** check results until it is approved. Also pay attention to lead times with your image partner.

Products without approved packaging samples, quality-assured food appendix and market picture at the deadline will not be activated by ICA.

Approved results on quality assurance at Validoo must be available to ICA at Validoo Q-lab.

In case of changes to the content of the food annex:

- ❗ If the content of the food appendix is changed on the item, a new food appendix must be sent to Validoo and quality assured.
- ❗ For **weighted goods, this change must be notified to ICA.**
- ❗ For example, if there is a change in allergens, labelling, new flavor and more, a new GTIN is required. More information about this can be found on the GS1 website.

Step 6 week 9-11: Detailed listing notice

Detailed listing message including item number to suppliers, as well as a dialogue between the chain and supplier about forecasts.

Step 7 week 1-13: Barcode Quality Assurance

Bar code must be quality assured and approved in accordance with the GS1 standard. This should be done as soon as possible in the revision process to minimize the risk of detecting problems with the barcode late on in the process and not having time to act before launch.

Step 8 week 9-15

Preparation for launch or phase out of trade item and implementation of activities e.g. planogram, product acquisition, sell-in at stores, etc.

Step 9 week 16

Start of implementation of product range change on store shelves –items in or out.

Procedure for changes in allergens

The EU Regulation on the provision of food information to consumers (EU1169/2011) requires that product information is the same for online sales as it is in physical stores. Since a product is identified by its GTIN, there is currently no other way to handle this than to change the GTIN when important ingredient changes are made.

This results in the following launch process for allergen GTIN changes:
